Greetings! from Mary McPhetridge, Executive Director

Spring is finally in the air. The Chamber office phones are ringing off the wall as the smelters call to find out if the ice has gone out and if the smelt are running. When we tell them they are not running they ALWAYS ask, "When will they run"? There are more old wives tale stories about smelt prediction than any other seasonal item we deal with at the chamber. Some say they run under the ice, some are adamant they do not run under the ice, some say it's the wind direction, some say it's purely water temperature. Whatever the reason, they aren't running yet and it will be a wait and see moment here in the bay! Regardless, people will venture up north and set out their nets and hopefully it will be a successful season... When it happens!

We are so fortunate to live in this beautiful area. Yesterday, we had some new residents stop in and ask several questions. Their daughter attended Northland College and they ended up loving the area and moved here to retire. They love the beauty of the area and doing a lot of outdoor activities and wanted to know about several city functions and ordinances along with wellness and fitness. It is interesting to see how people interpret the "Quality of Life". One person considers the beauty and peacefulness of the wilderness and the lake, while we will talk with others who vacationed here and moved here to retire because they too love the wilderness; they snowmobile and ATV. One is a motorized user, and one non-motorized user, but both believe this area offers them exactly what they are looking for "Quality of Life". It doesn't matter so much about the behavioral definition as much as the fact that they all want a safe environment and they include safety in the Quality of Life equation.

Sometimes, we read or hear about negative things happening in our area and it makes us question that safety net that we have placed on our region. I bring this to light because I know that as small communities go, especially around the bay, we do look out for our neighbors, and our neighbor's children. But, we need to do a better job of being aware of our surroundings. We need to have an extra eye on our neighborhoods, public places, and the happenings in our communities. The Opioid and Meth situation in the region is catastrophic and is real. While I honestly feel totally safe in my community and at work, I do keep my eyes open, because I know the numbers, the data, the stories, the reality of drug abuse and the trickle down affect it has on health, wellness, and safety. So, I'm asking that we all pitch in and be the eyes and ears that our law enforcement officials cannot; that we be the neighbor that makes sure the children in the neighborhood are safe, warm, and fed. Just be aware. The drug problem can't be handled totally by our law enforcement and our court system, they are over worked and over tasked and they are doing everything they can, but we all need to help. There is a drug task force that was formed a few months ago. Leaders in the community, law enforcement, medical professionals, law professionals, behavioral health professionals, professionals that work in the court and juvenile system and family court professionals. A daylong session to discuss this situation. There are so many agencies and organizations that ARE working on this problem, but it is even too big for many of them. There are so many of us that want to help, but we just don't know how. Being aware of our surroundings is number one! Maybe a neighborhood watch program where you and your neighbors get together and meet the new people. Build relationships and start relying on each other. Our communities have to come together to battle this problem as a community and we have to stop blaming those that sometimes don't have control. Our jails are full, we don't have enough Public Defenders, our District Attorney's case load has tripled within a relatively short period, and not because these people aren't doing their best, there are several reasons. Some are the laws in place or the reimbursement amounts for state or federally appointed personnel, some are the laws that while trying to protect, might not really be protecting. As we dive in deeper to look into solutions, we will be reaching out to residents, businesses, churches, etc. I believe there will be a grass-roots effort formed within our communities to look at what we can change concerning laws and ordinances and reimbursements. Our problem is not out of the ordinary. The whole country is tackling this. Many, many, many communities are coming together just as we are to look at these issues and figure out ways to come together and walk with people, neighbors, family members, friends, co-workers, and to support and help them with addiction. I know there are all sorts of people making bad choices, but for all of those, there are many, that don't want to live the life they are in. Addiction is a battle in itself and most of us know someone who is an addict, or is in recovery. I bring this to light through our newsletter not to bring a black cloud over our area, but to bring an opportunity to get together, and start taking back our communities and walking along those that want help!

The first week in May also marks the National Tourism Week! You'll be seeing a tabloid in the Daily Press that David Eades from the Bayfield Area Chamber & Visitor's Bureau and the Ashland Area Chamber of Commerce are working on focusing on Tourism and the Economic Impact dollars that generate through Ashland & Bayfield Counties. It's exciting and amazing to see not only the economics from tourism, but the social and health benefits that go along with taking a vacation, participating in events, and spending time with family. Highlighting our May Business After Hours host: St. Luke's Chequamegon Clinic

St. Luke's Chequamegon Clinic is now open in a new location. In March, St. Luke's Chequamegon Clinic opened the doors to its new home at 2201 Lake Shore Drive East. The 22,000-square-foot clinic sits near the shores of Lake Superior along the north side of U.S. Highway 2 between Culver's and the Ashland Honda Toyota dealership. It took nine

months to build, and the design maximizes views of the lake from roadways and public spaces and features lakefront views throughout the building.

Chequamegon Clinic has been serving patients in the community since 1975, and the new building gives patients a state-of-the-art experience. Currently the clinic is staffed with eight primary care providers, but the new clinic provides enough space for growth up to 12. For the first time the clinic also offers physical therapy services and 3D mammography. Chequamegon Clinic will continue to offer 17 outreach specialty services at its new location, which include cardiology. obstetrics and gynecology, orthopedics and sports medicine, urology, endocrinology, rheumatology, neurology, physical medicine, pulmonology, general surgery and vascular surgery. 
